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this book presents a general overview of our current knowledge of language development in children all the principal strands of language development are covered including phonological lexical syntactic and pragmatic development bilingualism precursors to language development in infancy and the language development of children with developmental disabilities including children with specific language impairment written by leading international authorities each chapter summarises clearly and lucidly our current state of knowledge and carefully explains and evaluates the theories which have been proposed to account for children s development in that area

the fifth edition of the development of language is written and contributed by leading researchers and covers language acquisition and development from infancy through adulthood with its organization based on developmental stages of language this book is especially well

this book presents a current interdisciplinary perspective on language requisites from both a biological comparative perspective and from a developmental learning perspective perspectives regarding language and language acquisition are advanced by scientists of various backgrounds speech hearing developmental psychology comparative psychology and language intervention this unique volume searches for a rational interface between findings and perspectives generated by language studies with humans and with chimpanzees intended to render a reconsideration as to the essence of language and the requisites to its acquisition it also provides readers with perspectives defined by various revisionists who hold that language might be other than the consequence of a mutation unique to humans and might fundamentally not be limited to speech

there is no single way in which children learn to communicate each child follows an individual developmental pattern just as you did still it is possible to describe a pattern of general communication development and of english specifically this text attempts such descriptions and generalizations but emphasizes individual patterns too

the anecdotal view of language acquisition is that children learn language with apparent ease no instruction and in very little time while adults find learning a new language to be cognitively challenging labour intensive and time consuming in this book herschensohn examines whether early childhood is a critical period for language acquisition after which individuals cannot learn a language as native speakers she argues that a first language is largely susceptible to age constraints showing major deficits past the age of twelve second language acquisition also shows age effects but with a range of individual differences the competence of expert adult learners the unequal achievements of child learners of second languages and the lack of consistent evidence for a maturational cut off all cast doubt on a critical period for second language acquisition

in recent years there has been increasing interest in the english used in singapore and malaysia including how children in these two countries acquire the languages used around them particularly on their acquisition of english this book is the first attempt to bring together studies on various aspects of this subject done by academics from the two countries it begins with two background papers on the linguistic situation in singapore and malaysia followed by studies of the cognitive development of children as it relates to language development the third and fourth sections of the book contain papers dealing variously with the sociolinguistic and psycholinguistic aspects of language use with important implications on language learning and teaching in a multilingual context

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
