this edited volume brings together scholars from psychology linguistics sociology and communication science to investigate how performative notions of gender and sexuality can be fruitfully explored with the rich set of tools that have been developed by conversation analysis and discursive psychology for analyzing everyday practical language use agency and identity in talk contributors re examine the foundations of earlier research on gender in spoken interaction critically appraise this research to see if and how it translates successfully into the study of sexuality in talk and promote innovative alternatives that integrate the insights of recent feminist

and queer theory with qualitative studies of talk and conversation detailed empirical analyses of naturally occurring talk are used to uncover how gender and sexual identities agencies and desires are contingently accomplished in conversational practices collectively they pose the important question of what a critical theory of talk gender and sexuality ought to look like if it is to be sensitive to a politics of conversation analysis

environmental history has traditionally told the story of man and nature scholars have too frequently overlooked the ways in which their predominantly male subjects have themselves been shaped by gender seeing nature through gender here reintroduces gender as a meaningful category of analysis for environmental history showing how women s actions desires and choices have shaped the world and seeing men as gendered actors as well in thirteen essays that show how gendered ideas have shaped the ways in which people have represented experienced and consumed their world virginia scharff and her coauthors explore interactions between gender and environment in history ranging from colonial borderlands to transnational boundaries from mountaintop to marketplace they focus on historical representations of humans and nature on questions about consumption on environmental politics and on the complex reciprocal relations among human bodies and changing landscapes they also challenge the ecofeminist position by challenging the notion that men and women are essentially different creatures with biologically different destinies each article shows how a person or group of people in history have understood nature in gendered terms and acted accordingly often with dire consequences for other people and organisms here are considerations of the ways we study sexuality among birds of william byrd s masking sexual encounters in his account of an eighteenth century expedition of how the ecology of fire in a changing built environment has reshaped firefighters own

gendered identities some are playful as in a piece on the evolution of snow bunnies to shred betties others are dead serious as in a chilling portrait of how endocrine disrupters are reinventing humans animals and water systems from the cellular level out aiding and adding significantly to the enterprise of environmental history seeing nature through gender bridges gender history and environmental history in unexpected ways to show us how the natural world can remake the gendered patterns we ve engraved on ourselves and on the planet

this text focuses specifically on three interrelated sets of questions with respect to gender politics and communication how do serious and popular media alike represent male and female politicians how do they frame their politics and how can these representations and frames be explained what is the role of mainstream and movement media for the women s movement how are feminist issues covered in the media and what kinds of media related activities do women s movements undertake how are the social and political concerns of ordinary women voiced in the media in talkshows in particular and how does this different popular platform interact with mainstream and feminist politics

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
