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winner of the 2018 book award from the american studies division of the national communication association ongoing interest in the turmoil of the 1960s clearly demonstrates how these social conflicts continue to affect contemporary politics in the bad sixties hollywood memories of the counterculture antiwar and black power movements kristen hoerl focuses on fictionalized

portrayals of 1960s activism in popular television and film hoerl shows how hollywood has perpetuated politics deploring the detrimental consequences of the 1960s on traditional american values during the decade people collectively raised fundamental questions about the limits of democracy under capitalism but hollywood has proved dismissive if not adversarial to the role of dissent in fostering progressive social change film and television are salient resources of shared understanding for audiences born after the 1960s because movies and television programs are the most accessible visual medium for observing the decade s social movements hoerl indicates that a variety of television programs such as family ties the wonder years and law and order along with hollywood films including forrest gump have reinforced images of the bad sixties these stories portray a period in which urban riots antiwar protests sexual experimentation drug abuse and feminism led to national division and moral decay according to hoerl these messages supply distorted civics lessons about what we should value and how we might legitimately participate in our democracy these warped messages contribute to selective amnesia a term that stresses how popular media renders radical ideas and political projects null or nonexistent selective amnesia removes the spectacular events and figures that define the late 1960s from their motives and context flattening their meaning into reductive stereotypes despite popular television and film hoerl explains memory of 1960s activism still offers a potent resource for imagining how we can strive collectively to achieve social justice and equality

far out poems of the 60s includes poems by over 80 poets who remember that tumultuous decade from a wide range of vantage points this collection brings to life the experiences of people who vividly remember the effects of the assassinations of medgar evars jfk malcolm x and martin luther king who lived through the period of the vietnam war and the protests against it and who experienced the rise of second wave feminism the civil rights act and the emergence of the black power movement as well as the apollo 11 moon landing

at the beginning of the sixties barry miles was at art school in cheltenham at the end he was running the beatles zapple label and living in new york s legendary chelsea hotel this is the story of what happened in between in the sixties is a memoir by one of the key figures of the british counterculture a friend of ginsberg and corso miles helped to organise the 1965 albert hall

poetry reading he co founded and ran the indica bookshop the command centre for the london underground scene and he published europe s first underground newspaper international times it from indica s basement miles partners in indica were john dunbar then married to marianne faithfull and peter asher through asher miles became closely involved with the beatles particularly paul mccartney and in the sixties is full of intimate glimpses of the beatles at work and play other musicians who appear in its pages include the rolling stones the pink floyd leonard cohen and frank zappa but miles greatest love is for the written word and his book includes memorable portraits of allen ginsberg william burroughs charles olson richard brautigan and charles bukowski this is the book that ever

sex drugs and rock n roll in the 1970s encounters with the legends of the decade

in the late 1960s and early 1970s hundreds of thousands of white middle class american youths suddenly became hippies this short overview of the hippie social movement in the united states examines the movement s beliefs and practices including psychedelic drugs casual sex and rock music as well as the phenomena of spiritual seeking hostility to politics and communes w j rorabaugh synthesizes how hippies strived for authenticity expressed individualism and yearned for community viewing the

tumultuous sixties from a new angle rorabaugh shows how the counterculture led to subsequent social and cultural changes in the united states with legacies including casual sex natural foods and even the personal computer

in his seminal socio history of punk england s dreaming jon savage makes the bald assertion that charles radcliffe laid the foundation for the next twenty years of sub cultural theory referring in particular to his 1966 piece the seeds of social destruction that appeared in the first of two issues of radcliffe s co authored insurrectionary street zine heatwave teddy boys ton up kids mods and rockers beats ban the bombers the ravers jazz heads radcliffe argued that the bank holiday bust ups the demos the riots the sex drugs n rock n roll these were all part of a youth revolt that has left a permanent mark on this society has challenged assumptions and status and been prepared to vomit its disgust in the streets the youth revolt has not always been comfortable valid to the point or helpful it has however made its first stumbling political gestures with an immediacy that revolutionaries should not deny but envy radcliffe joined the international situationists within the year alongside english founder chris gray but by the time 1968 had ended and youthful revolt had fed into wide pockets of political turmoil globally radcliffe had started to drift towards other poles of late 60s s counterculture he ended the 60 s in long hair and loon pants banged up in a belgian prison on hash smuggling charges this epic 900 pages book follows radcliffes trials and tribulations from public school beginnings into the 60 s underground and the mr nice style large scale hash smuggling years his friend howard marks pops up throughout on to prison divorce remarriage and beyond it offers up important first hand perspectives on 60 s 70 s counterculture and an intimate portrait of a man who seemed to face the slings and arrows that fortune threw at him with a never ending supply of equanimity and high grade hash

turn on tune in drop out timothy leary advised young people in the 1960s and many did creating a counterculture built on drugs rock music sexual liberation and communal living the hippies preached free love promoted flower power and cautioned against trusting anyone over thirty eschewing money materialism and politics they repudiated the mainstream values of the times along the way these counterculturists created a lasting legacy and inspired long lasting social changes the hippies and american values uses an innovative approach to exploring the tenets of the counterculture movement rather than relying on interviews conducted years after the fact timothy miller uses underground newspapers published at the time to provide a full and in depth exploration this reliance on primary sources brings an immediacy and vibrancy rarely seen in other studies of the

period miller focuses primarily on the cultural revolutionaries rather than on the political radicals of the new left it examines the hippies ethics of dope sex rock community and cultural opposition and surveys their effects on current american values filled with illustrations from alternative publications along with posters cartoons and photographs the hippies and american values provides a graphic look at america in the 1960s this second edition features a new introduction and a thoroughly updated well documented text highly readable and engaging this volume brings deep insight to the counterculture movement and the ways it changed america the first edition became a widely used course adoption favorite and scholars and students of the 1960s will welcome the second edition of this thought provoking book

the hippie movement of the 1960s helped change modern societal attitudes toward ethnic and cultural diversity environmental accountability spiritual expressiveness and the justification of war with roots in the beat literary movement of the late 1950s the hippie perspective also advocated a bohemian lifestyle which expressed distaste for hypocrisy and materialism yet did so without the dark somewhat forced undertones of their predecessors this cultural revaluation which developed as a direct response to the dark days of world war ii created a counterculture which came to be at the epicenter of an american societal debate and ultimately saw the beginnings of postmodernism focusing on 1962 through 1976 this book takes a constructivist look at the hippie era s key works of prose which in turn may be viewed as the literary canon of the counterculture it examines the ways in which these works with their tendency toward whimsy and spontaneity are genuinely reflective of the period arranged chronologically the discussed works function as a lens for viewing the period as a whole providing a more rounded sense of the hippie zeitgeist that shaped and inspired the period among the 15 works represented are one flew over the cuckoo s nest the crying of lot 49 trout fishing in america siddhartha stranger in a strange land slaughterhouse five and the fan man

say the sixties and the images start coming images of a time when all authority was defied and millions of young americans thought they could change the world either through music drugs and universal love or by putting their bodies on the line against injustice and war todd gitlin the highly regarded writer media critic and professor of sociology at the university of

california berkeley has written an authoritative and compelling account of this supercharged decade a decade he helped shape as an early president of students for a democratic society sds and an organizer of the first national demonstration against the vietnam war part critical history part personal memoir part celebration and part meditation this critically acclaimed work resurrects a generation on all its glory and tragedy from the trade paperback edition

in 1968 newsweek reported an imminent threat of twenty thousand hippies descending on portland oregon although the numbers were exaggerated portland did boast a vibrant 1960s culture of disenchanted and disenfranchised individuals seeking social and political revolution barefoot and bell bottomed they hung out in portland s bohemian underground and devised a better world what began in coffee shop conversations found its voice in the willamette bridge newspaper kboo radio station and the portland state university student strike resulting in social artistic and political change in the rose city through these stories from the counterculture author polina olsen brings to life the beat snapping caffe espresso the incense and black light posters of the psychedelic supermarket and the spontaneous concerts and communal soups in lair park

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
