this volume advocates a shift from the social constructivism found in the work of thomas luckmann and peter berger to a communicative constructivism that acknowledges communication as an embodied form of action in its own right according to which social actors in engaging in communicative action construct a material social reality that guides delimits and enables actions a study of the importance of understanding the role of communication in an age in which digitization and mediatization have extended the reach of communication to a global level and brought about the emergence of the communication society the communicative construction of reality shows how communication society does not merely replace modern society and its hierarchical institutions but complements it in a manner that continually results in conflicts leading to the refiguration of society as such it will appeal to scholars of sociology with interests in the sociology of knowledge communication and social theory

this collection brings together the best contemporary philosophical work in the area of intersection between philosophy of language and the law some of the contributors are philosophers of language who are interested in applying advances in philosophy of language to legal issues and some of the participants are philosophers of law who are interested in applying insights and theories from philosophy of language to their work on the nature of law and legal interpretation by making this body of recent work available in a single volume readers will gain both a general overview of the various interactions between language and law and also detailed analyses of particular areas in which this interaction is manifest the contributions to this volume are grouped under three main general areas the first area concerns a critical assessment in light of recent advances in philosophy of language of the foundational role of language in understanding the nature of law itself the

second main area concerns a number of ways in which an understanding of language can resolve some of the issues prevalent in legal interpretation such as the various ways in which semantic content can differ from law's assertive content the contribution of presuppositions and pragmatic implicatures in understanding what the law conveys the role of vagueness in legal language for example the third general topic concerns the role of language in the context of particular legal doctrines and legal solutions to practical problems such as the legal definitions of inchoate crimes the legal definition of torture or the contractual doctrines concerning default rules together these three key issues cover a wide range of philosophical interests in law that can be elucidated by a better understanding of language and linguistic communication

the longitudinal investigation which provides the basic material for this book consists of a corpus of requests offers and refusals of offers elicited from Irish learners of German over a ten month study abroad period using production questionnaires and a variety of metapragmatic instruments

this book explores the philosophical foundations of communication studies suggesting that communication phenomena extend beyond the scope of traditional scientific methods it argues that communication deeply intertwined with human behavior cannot be fully comprehended through empirical methods alone the book presents an epistemological alternative to empiricism in communication studies an alternative rooted in the praxeological perspective drawing from the principles of rationalism it proposes that conclusions about communication can be deduced from a priori theoretical truths rather than empirical evidence this book is a crucial resource for scholars in both philosophy and communication studies
