these volumes provide a description of source material a detailed glossary of terms indexes of short and long biographies on organ builders and groups of organ builders and a classification of species of organ cases by type in addition to a detailed inventory of early organs organized geographically

including contributions from leading scholars in the field from both australia and north america this collection explores diverse approaches to writing the lives of historians and ways of assessing the importance of doing so beginning with the writing of autobiographies by historians the volume then turns to biographical studies both of historians whose writings were in some sense nation defining and those who may be regarded as having had a major influence on defining the discipline of history the final section explores elements of collective biography linking these to the formation of historical networks a concluding essay by barbara caine offers a critical appraisal of the study of historians biographies and autobiographies to date and maps out likely new directions for future work clio s lives is a very good scholarly collection that advances the study of autobiography and biography within the writing of history itself taking theoretical questions in significant new

directions the contributors are well known and highly respected in the history profession and write with an insight and intellectual energy that will ensure the book has considerable impact they examine cutting edge issues about the writing of history at the personal level through autobiography and biography in diverse and innovative ways together the writers have provided reflective chapters that will be widely read for their impressive theoretical advances as well as being inspirational for new entrants to the disciplinary area patricia grimshaw university of melbourne *clio s lives* brings together a most interesting and varied cast of contributors its chapters contain sophisticated and well penned ruminations on the uses of biography and autobiography among historians these are clearly connected with the general themes of the volume this delightfully mixed bag makes very good reading and as well will serve as a substantial contribution to the study of the biography and autobiography eric richards flinders university

this book is a portrait of the period when modern art became contemporary art it explores how and why writers and artists in australia argued over the idea of a distinctively australian modern and then postmodern art from 1962 the date of publication of a foundational book *australian painting 1788 1960* up to 1988 the year of the australian bicentennial across nine chapters about art exhibitions curators and critics this book describes the shift from modern art to contemporary art through the successive attempts to define a place in the world for australian art but by 1988 australian art looked less and less like a viable tradition inside which to interpret our art instead vast gaps appeared since mostly male and often older white writers had limited their horizons to white australia alone national stories by white men like borders had less and less explanatory value underneath this a perplexing subject remained the absence of aboriginal art in understanding what australian art was during the period that established the idea of a distinctive australian modern and then contemporary art this book reflects on why the embrace of aboriginal art was so late in art museums and histories of australian art arguing that this was because it was not part of a national story dominated by colonial then neo colonial dependency it is important reading for all scholars of both global and australian art and for curators and artists

karl marx circles us and we him this reflects the power of his legacy but it also indicates the nature of the intellectual process we move around objects of interest and insight working by successive approximations peter beilharz has been circling marx for forty years this volume of essays expands the metaphor by working through three circles in the history of marxism the first works with marx the second with the classical legacy through to bolshevism and western marxism the third steps closer to the present in thinkers such as bauman heller and castoriadis read together these essays represent a lifetime s engagement with marx and his intellectual consequences

a companion to australian art is a thorough introduction to the art produced in australia from the arrival of the first fleet in

1788 to the early 21st century beginning with the colonial art made by Australia's first European settlers this volume presents a collection of clear and accessible essays by established art historians and emerging scholars alike engaging clearly written chapters provide fresh insights into the principal Australian art movements considered from a variety of chronological regional and thematic perspectives the text seeks to provide a balanced account of historical events to help readers discover the art of Australia on their own terms and draw their own conclusions the book begins by surveying the historiography of Australian art and exploring the history of art museums in Australia the following chapters discuss art forms such as photography sculpture portraiture and landscape painting examining the practice of art in the separate colonies before federation and in the Commonwealth from the early 20th century to the present day this authoritative volume covers the last 250 years of art in Australia including the early colonial high colonial and federation periods as well as the successive modernist styles of the 20th century and considers how traditional Aboriginal art has adapted and changed over the last fifty years the companion to Australian art is a valuable resource for both undergraduate and graduate students of the history of Australian artforms from colonization to postmodernism and for general readers with an interest in the nation's colonial art history

having served as a member of the allied forces occupation of Japan Bernard Smith has produced a book about the time he spent in Japan in 1946 in the city of Iwakuni near Hiroshima both of which cities are located on the east coast of Japan alongside its beautiful Inland Sea except for his rather mystifying visit to Tokyo in the summer of 1946 his entire book is based almost entirely on his personal diary and notes which he wrote while aboard his homeward bound ship at the end of his tour of duty at the end of that year crucially when the events he describes were still very fresh in his mind he writes about the utter devastation and despair under which people were living after the horrors of Hiroshima about the Japanese peoples response to the allied occupation and the resilience and fortitude with which they faced up to their troubles as opposed to formal and official documents Bernard Smith writes about human suffering and the harsh conditions under which

people were living he tells us of his meetings with families with whom he found relaxation from the gloom and with whom he became very friendly he also describes how the people faithfully continued to follow their traditional japanese customs and culture the observance of which he believes sustained them and helped them begin their ultimate recovery

bernard smith is widely recognised as one of australia s leading intellectuals yet the recognition of his work has been partial focused on art history and anthropology peter beilharz argues that smith s work also contains a social theory or a way of thinking about australian culture and identity in the world system smith enables us to think matters of place and cultural imperialism through the image of being not australian so much as antipodean australian identities are constructed by the relationship between core and periphery making them both european and other at the same time this 1997 work is a book length analysis of bernard smith s work and is the result of careful and systematic research into smith s published works and his private papers it is both an introduction to smith s thinking and an important interpretive argument about imperialism and the antipodes

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
