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the slave narrative has become a crucial genre within african american literary studies and an invaluable record of the experience and history of slavery in the united states this companion examines the slave narrative s relation to british and american abolitionism anglo american literary traditions such as autobiography and sentimental literature and the larger african american literary tradition special attention is paid to leading exponents of the genre such as olaudah equiano frederick douglass and harriet jacobs as well as many other less well known examples further essays explore the rediscovery of the slave narrative and its subsequent critical reception as well as the uses to which the genre is put by modern authors such as toni morrison with its chronology and guide to further reading the companion provides both an easy entry point for students new to the subject and comprehensive coverage and original insights for scholars in the field

given the rise of new interdisciplinary and methodological approaches to african american and black atlantic studies the oxford handbook of the african american slave narrative will offer a fresh wide ranging assessment of this major american literary genre the volume will begin with articles that consider the fundamental concerns of gender sexuality community and the christian ethos of suffering and redemption that are central to any understanding of slave narratives the chapters that follow will interrogate the various agendas behind the production of both pre and post emancipation narratives and take up the various interpretive problems they pose strategic omissions and veiled gestures were often necessary in these life accounts as they revealed disturbing too painful truths far beyond what white audiences were prepared to hear while touching upon the familiar canonical autobiographies of frederick douglass and harriet jacobson the handbook will pay more attention to the under studied narratives of josiah henson sojourner truth william grimes henry box brown and other often overlooked accounts in addition to the literary autobiographies of bondage the volume will anatomize the powerful wpa recordings of interviews with former slaves during the late 1930s with essays on the genre's imaginative afterlife its final essays will chart the emergence and development of neoslave narratives most notably in styron's the confessions of nat turner toni morrison's beloved and octavia butler's provocative science fiction novel kindred in short the handbook will provide a long overdue assessment of the state of the genre and the vital scholarship that continues to grow around it work that is offering some of the most provocative analysis emerging out of the literary studies discipline as a whole

american literature has a rich potential for delivering the narratives of the american people who are often confined by their race ethnicity gender social class economic situation or in very simple terms by the conditions of their birth in this context the volume focuses on the confinement narratives within the products of literature with a wide array of chapters from different periods of american literary history

it is impossible to understand america without understanding the history of african americans in nearly seven hundred entries the encyclopedia of african american history 1619 1895 documents the full range of the african american experience during that period from the arrival of the first slave ship to the death of frederick douglass and shows how all aspects of american culture history and national identity have been profoundly influenced by the experience of african americans the encyclopedia covers an extraordinary range of subjects major topics such as abolitionism black nationalism the civil war the dred scott case reconstruction slave rebellions and insurrections the underground railroad and voting rights are given the in depth treatment one would expect but the encyclopedia also contains hundreds of fascinating entries on less obvious subjects such as the african grove theatre black seafarers buffalo soldiers the catholic church and african americans cemeteries and burials gender midwifery new york african free schools oratory and verbal arts religion and slavery the secret six and much more in addition the encyclopedia offers brief biographies of important african americans as well as white americans who have played a significant role in african american history from crispus attucks john brown and henry ward beecher to olaudah equiano frederick douglass sarah grimke sojourner truth nat turner phillis wheatley and many others all of the encyclopedia's alphabetically arranged entries are accessibly written and free of jargon and technical terms to facilitate ease of use many composite entries gather similar topics under one headword the entry for slave narratives for example includes three subentries the slave narrative in america from the colonial period to the civil war interpreting

slave narratives and african and british slave narratives a headnote detailing the various subentries introduces each composite entry selective bibliographies and cross references appear at the end of each article to direct readers to related articles within the encyclopedia and to primary sources and scholarly works beyond it a topical outline chronology of major events nearly 300 black and white illustrations and comprehensive index further enhance the work's usefulness

one of the most exciting and eclectic celebrations of african american art ever published narratives of african american art and identity showcases one hundred paintings etchings sculptures and photographs from the collection of david c driskell a true renaissance man driskell himself is an esteemed artist educator curator and philanthropist his fifty year career has been committed to promoting african american art included are works by john biggers sam gilliam lois mailou jones keith morrison henry ossawa tanner alma thomas romare bearden elizabeth catlett augusta savage and james vanderzee to name just a few each artwork is accompanied by information about the artist and the particular work this book is the catalog for the exhibition of the same title which travelled to various american museums through february 2001

few critical studies have examined the african american slave narratives that were written in arabic and none of these has seized the occasion to reconsider the problems of translation and canon formation the relationship between literacy and reason and the relation of western enlightenment reason to arabic texts ronald a t judy offers an alternative interpretation of literacy that challenges the claim of traditional enlightenment discourse that literacy and reason are the privileged properties of western culture judy argues on the basis of his readings of autobiographical african american arabic slave narratives that through the production of the arabic text the african slave already had the necessary element that the west attributes to reason before his original introduction to western culture a literacy that already mediated between africa and europe paying careful attention to the problems of translation and canon formation the book sets out to demonstrate how cultural values the humanities and western figures of reason must be transformed and in particular how national literary traditions must be reconstituted and globalized in the light of current events it includes the first published translation of the longest arabic language slave narrative known to exist in north america which is said to be an autobiographical 19th century arabic slave narrative known as ben ali's diary

the oxford handbook of the african american slave narrative approaches the history of slave testimony in three ways by prioritizing the broad tradition over individual authors by representing interdisciplinary approaches to slave narratives and by highlighting emerging scholarship on slave narratives concerning both established debates over concerns of authorship and agency for example and developing concerns like ecocritical readings of slave narratives ultimately the aim of the handbook is not to highlight the singularity of any particular account nor to comfortably locate slave narratives in traditional literary or cultural history but rather to faithfully represent a body of writing and testimony that was designed to speak for the many to represent the unspeakable and to account for the experience of enslaved and nominally free communities

women have had a complex experience in african american culture the first work of its kind this encyclopedia approaches african american literature from a women's studies perspective

while yolanda williams page's encyclopedia of african american women writers provides biographical entries on more than 150 literary figures this book is much broader in scope included are several hundred alphabetically arranged entries on african american women writers as well as on male writers who have treated women in their works entries on genres periods themes characters historical events texts places and other topics are included as well each entry is written by an expert contributor and relates its subject to the overall experience of women in african american literature entries cite works for further reading and the encyclopedia closes with a selected general bibliography african american culture is enormously diverse and the experience of women in african american society is especially complex women were among the first african american writers and works by black women writers are popular among students and general readers alike at the same time african american women have been oppressed and texts by black male authors represent women in a variety of ways the first of its kind this encyclopedia approaches african american literature from a women's studies perspective and thus significantly illuminates the african american cultural experience through literary works included are several hundred alphabetically arranged entries written by numerous expert contributors in addition to covering male and female african american authors the encyclopedia also discusses themes major works and characters genres periods historical events places and other topics included are entries on such authors as maya angelou james baldwin frederick douglass nikki giovanni june jordan claudette mckay ishmael reed sojourner truth phillis wheatley and many others in addition the many works discussed include *beloved* *blanche on the lam* *iknow why the caged bird sings* *the men of brewster place* *quicksand* *the street* *waiting to exhale* and many more the many topical entries cover black feminism black nationalism conjuring children's and young adult literature detective fiction epistolary novel motherhood sexuality spirituality stereotypes and many others entries relate their topics to the experience of african american women and cite works for further reading features and benefits includes hundreds of alphabetically arranged entries draws on the work of numerous expert contributors includes a selected general bibliography offers a range of finding aids such as a list of entries a guide to related topics and an extensive index supports the literature curriculum by helping students analyze major writers and works supports the social studies curriculum by helping students use literature to understand the experience of african american women covers the full chronological range of african american literature fosters a respect for cultural diversity develops research skills by directing students to additional sources of information builds bridges between african american history literature and women's studies

allowing us to eavesdrop on the past the sounds of slavery is a fascinating innovative and accessible account of the aural dimension of slavery through vivid anecdotes and firsthand accounts white and white expand our historical ear from the 1700s through the 1850s showing how profoundly slaves shaped the american soundscape from the quotidian sounds of a plantation at dawn to the baying of hounds on the trail of runaways to whistling in richmond virginia in the 1850s this book is the closest we'll ever get to imagining and re-creating the diverse sounds of slavery enhancing the experience with an 18 track cd compilation with most of the tracks recorded in the 1930s white and white enable us to hear a complex history that for too long has been silent

african american slave narratives of the 19th century recorded the atrocities of the antebellum south and provided a solid foundation for the african american literary tradition

by presenting 16 slave narratives in their entirety this reference conveniently documents this historically significant literary genre a vivid and moving history of african americans seeking to establish community liberty economic independence and education within the constraints of a repressive society this reference intentionally avoids well known narratives and instead collects unavailable and otherwise difficult to find texts to add to the value of the work for researchers and general readers alike each narrative is accompanied by a preface explanatory notes and suggestions for further reading many of the narratives gathered here were influential when initially published josiah henson s presentation of himself for example embodies many of the characteristics given to uncle tom by harriet beecher stowe in her novel uncle tom s cabin while other collections often only provide excerpts from widely available texts this reference includes complete narratives the introductions and annotations redefine current thinking in the field by closely examining how these authors used language structured their writing and crafted their autobiographies by examining the historical cultural literary and social issues that african americans have faced since their arrival this reference provides the broad context necessary to understand the literary historical and intellectual traditions from which these writings developed

unlike any other book of its kind this volume celebrates published works from a broad range of american ethnic groups not often featured in the typical canon of literature this culturally rich encyclopedia contains 160 alphabetically arranged entries on african american asian american latino a and native american literary traditions among others the book introduces the uniquely american mosaic of multicultural literature by chronicling the achievements of american writers of non european descent and highlighting the ethnic diversity of works from the colonial era to the present the work features engaging topics like the civil rights movement bilingualism assimilation and border narratives entries provide historical overviews of literary periods along with profiles of major authors and great works including toni morrison maxine hong kingston maya angelou sherman alexie a raisin in the sun american born chinese and the house on mango street the book also provides concise overviews of genres not often featured in textbooks like the chinese american novel african american young adult literature mexican american autobiography and cuban american poetry

the encyclopedia of african cultural heritage in north america provides an accessible ready reference on the retention and continuity of african culture within the united states our conceptual framework holds first that culture is a form of self knowledge and knowledge about self in the world as transmitted from one person to another second that african people continuously create their own cultural history as they move through time and space third that african descended people living outside of africa are also contributors to and participate in the creation of african cultural history entries focus on illuminating africanisms cultural retentions traceable to an african origin and cultural continuities ongoing practices and processes through which african culture continues to be created and formed thus the focus is more culturally specific and less concerned with the broader transatlantic demographic political and geographic issues that are the focus of similar recent reference works we also focus less on biographies of individuals and political and economic ties and more on processes and manifestations of african cultural heritage and continuity features a two volume a to z work available in a choice of print or electronic formats 350 signed entries each concluding with cross references and further readings 150 figures and photos front matter consisting of an introduction and a reader s guide organizing entries thematically to more easily guide

users to related entries signed articles concluding with cross references

these autobiographies of afro american ex slaves comprise the largest body of literature produced by slaves in human history the book consists of three sections selected reviews of slave narratives dating from 1750 to 1861 essays examining how such narratives serve as historical material and essays exploring the narratives as literary artifacts

using the term prophetic remembrance to articulate the expression of a constituent faith in the performative capacity of language erica still shows how black subjectivity is born of and interprets cultural trauma she brings together african american neo slave narratives and black south african postapartheid narratives to reveal the processes by which black subjectivity accounts for its traumatic origins names the therapeutic work of the present and

inscribes the possibility of the future the author draws on trauma studies black theology and literary criticism as she considers how writers such as toni morrison charles johnson john edgar wideman david bradley sindiwe magona k sello duiker and zakes mda explore the possibilities for rehearsing a traumatic past without being overcome by it although both african american and south african literary studies have addressed questions of memory narrative and trauma little comparative work has been done prophetic remembrance offers this comparative focus in reading these literatures together to address the question of what it means to remember and to recover from racial oppression

classic african american women s narratives offers teachers students and general readers a one volume collection of the most memorable and important prose written by african american women before 1865 the book reproduces the canon of african american women s fiction and autobiography during the slavery era in u s history each text in the volume represents a first maria stewart s religion and the pure principles of morality 1831 was the first political tract authored by an african american woman jarena lee s life and religious experience 1836 was the first african american woman s spiritual autobiography the narrative of sojourner truth 1850 was the first slave narrative to focus on the experience of a female slave in the united states frances e w harper s the two offers 1859 was the first short story published by an african american woman harriet e wilson s our nig 1859 was the first novel written by an african american woman harriet jacob s incidents in the life of a slave girl 1861 was the first autobiography authored by an african american woman charlotte fortens life on the sea islands 1864 was the first contribution by an african american woman to a major american literary magazine the atlantic monthly complemented with an introduction by william l andrews this is the only one volume collection to gather the most important works of the first great era of african american women s writing

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
