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the handbook will offer a survey of the field of linguistics in the early 21st century for the southeast asian linguistic

area the last half century has seen a great increase in work on language contact work in genetic theoretical and descriptive linguistics and since the 1990s especially documentation of endangered languages the book will provide an account of work in these areas focusing on the achievements of seasian linguistics as well as the challenges and unresolved issues and provide a survey of the relevant major publications and other available resources we will address survey of the languages of the area organized along genetic lines with discussion of relevant political and cultural background issues theoretical descriptive and typological issues genetic classification and historical linguistics areal and contact linguistics other areas of interest such as sociolinguistics semantics writing systems etc resources major monographs and monograph series dictionaries journals electronic data bases etc grammar sketches of languages representative of the genetic and structural diversity of the region

the handbook of the austroasiatic languages is the first comprehensive reference work on this important language family of south and southeast asia austroasiatic languages are spoken by more than 100 million people from central india to vietnam from malaysia to southern china including national language cambodian and vietnamese and more than 130 minority communities large and small the handbook comprises two parts overviews and grammar sketches part 1 the overview chapters cover typology classification historical reconstruction plus a special overview of the munda languages part 2 some 27 scholars present grammar

sketches of 21 languages representing 12 of the 13 branches the sketches are carefully prepared according to the editors unifying typological approach ensuring analytical and notational comparability throughout

every language has been influenced in some way by other languages in many cases this influence is reflected in words which have been absorbed from other languages as the names for newer items or ideas such as perestroika manga or intifada from russian japanese and arabic respectively in other cases the influence of other languages goes deeper and includes the addition of new sounds grammatical forms and idioms to the pre existing language for example english s structure has been shaped in such a way by the effects of norse french latin and celtic though english is not alone in its openness to these influences any features can potentially be transferred from one language to another if the sociolinguistic and structural circumstances allow for it further new languages pidgins creoles and mixed languages can come into being as the result of language contact in thirty three chapters the oxford handbook of language contact examines the various forms of contact induced linguistic change and the levels of language which have provided instances of these influences in addition it provides accounts of how language contact has affected some twenty languages spoken and signed from all parts of the world chapters are written by experts and native speakers from years of research and fieldwork ultimately this handbook provides an authoritative account of the possibilities and products of contact induced linguistic change

the kingdom of cambodia has an ancient pedigree a time when its people first established small principalities which evolved in small kingdoms these kingdoms merged often violently eventually establishing the great angkorian kingdom of the khmer the great building complex known as angkor wat an achievement of stupendous proportion whose dimensions are still being determined is a product of the khmer empire the empire was subject to much tension both internally from competing nobles who sought to ascend the powerful throne to outside kingdoms who tried to invade and subjugate the khmer vietnam to the east and further south also to the east was the cham empire while to the west was the thai these three kingdoms warred with the khmer eventually reducing it from grandeur after the khmer empire fell cambodia entered a dark ages a period of 431 years from 1431 to 1862 years of scant records historians today try to reconstruct why the empire fell and why its people moved from the siem reap area and why records from this time are almost entirely unknown in 1862 france became

cambodia's protector defending its autonomy from both vietnam and thailand siam who were both nibbling at either end of cambodia the protectorate ended in 1942 when the japanese occupied the land followed by the return of the french in 1945 after the end of the second world war as in other countries subjugated by colonist powers the defeat of france encouraged cambodian nationalists to fight for a return to independence and autonomy it is in this crucible that the khmer rouge a communist inspired group began an insurrection against the french and later against the cambodian government the khmer rouge inspired by nihilistic beliefs came to power in 1975 and began the tragic genocide of the cambodian people between a quarter to a third of the people were murdered representing the best and the elite of its society there were many actors in this saga both ancient and modern i review these persons to the extent known and the roles they played in cambodian history and the effect it has had on the country today the character of pol pot mastermind and leader of the khmer rouge is of special importance i review his strange way of not identifying with a leadership role until absolutely necessary but the menace of this man went much deeper through guile and bland smiles he allayed fear about himself though he ordered the murder of those closest to him yet even as they were led away they disbelieved the order for their deaths believing that if they could but have a moment with him all would be set right even those closest to him did not see him for the monster he really was he was a master at guile and deception with none seeing the man as the monster of terror and destruction even in the far east where exhibiting emotion and genuine feeling is shunned to the nth degree this man's ability to remain hidden reflects the ultimate achievement but he brought ruin to his nation with today's loss of the elite of the country i spent two months in cambodia visiting and researching material for this review during my time there i visited the only synagogue in the country the chabad house in phnom penh it was then that i became aware of an amazing fact a granddaughter of royalty celebrated her bat mitzvah in the capital attended by members of the royal family the story of how a member of the cambodian royal family became jewish is itself an incredible development cambodia today is a third world country with many attractions both superb and revolting at core its representations reflect the saga of humanity whose pages are sometimes elevating and also horrific i describe my journey to this corner of asia hoping i've done justice to its many contours and personalities

a mon khmer comparative dictionary is the magnum opus of professor harry l shorto 1919 1995 formerly professor

of mon khmer studies in the university of london school of oriental and african studies until his retirement in 1984 he is the author of two standard reference works a dictionary of modern spoken mon 1962 and the highly respected author of the standard reference to epigraphic mon a dictionary of the mon inscriptions 1971 as well as the classic dictionary shorto held the chair in mon khmer studies the mkcd is shorto s grand synthesis of seventy years of historical and comparative research on the mon khmer languages meant to be published in the early 1980s shorto s manuscript was rediscovered by his daughter anna and has been carefully edited in line with the author s intentions the mkcd presents 2 246 etymologies with almost 30 000 lexical citations even today it is the most extensive analysis of mon khmer to appear since wilhelm schmidt laid the foundations of comparative mon khmer exactly 100 years ago with the *grundzüge einer lautlehre der mon khmer sprachen* 1905 and *die mon khmer völker* 1906 a mon khmer comparative dictionary includes numerous munda austronesian thai burmese and chinese lexical comparisons it is an incomparable resource for studying southeast asia s rich legacy of language contact and for investigating distant genetic relations with its largest oldest language family clearly establishing the terms of reference for future discussion of mon khmer etymology shorto s mkcd joins such defining works as emeneau and burrow s *a dravidian etymological dictionary* 1961 and turner s *a comparative dictionary of the indo aryan languages* 1966 85 in the canon of 20th century comparative linguistics

this volume seeks to foreground a borderless history and geography of south southeast and east asian littoral zones that would be maritime focused and thereby explore the ancient connections and dynamics of interaction that favoured the encounters among the cultures found throughout the region stretching from the indian ocean littorals to the western pacific from the early historical period to the present transcending the artificial boundaries of macro regions and nation states and trying to bridge the arbitrary divide between inherently cosmopolitan high cultures e g sanskritic sinitic or islamicate and local or indigenous cultures this multidisciplinary volume explores the metaphor of monsoon asia as a vast geo environmental area inhabited by speakers of numerous language phyla which for millennia has formed an integrated system of littorals where crops goods ideas cosmologies and ritual practices circulated on the sea routes governed by the seasonal monsoon winds the collective body of work presented in the volume describes monsoon asia as an ideal theatre for circulatory dynamics of cultural transfer interaction acceptance selection and avoidance and argues that despite the rich ethnic linguistic and sociocultural

diversity a shared pattern of values norms and cultural models is discernible throughout the region
