a tale blazed through heaven examines developments in the representation of the classical tale of mars venus and vulcan in the literature and painting of the golden age of spain c 1526 1681 anchored in close analysis of individual primary texts the five chapters that comprise this study assess how poets and painters breathed new life into the tale inherited from homer ovid and others examining some of the ways in which the story of mars venus and vulcan was disguised developed
