the handbook of the psychology of aging has become the definitive reference source for information on the psychology of adult development and aging the fifth edition provides comprehensive reviews of research on biological and social influences on behavior and age related changes in psychological function in addition to covering environmental influences on behavior and aging and gender differences in aging new chapters in the fifth edition discuss wisdom creativity and technological change and the older worker this handbook is an essential reference for researchers in adult development and gerontology and suitable as an advanced textbook for courses on the psychology of aging

when confronted with a neurological or psychiatric disorder in an elderly individual a clinician or researcher is likely to ask how the processes of ageing have influenced the aetiology and presentation of the disorder and will impact on its efficient management there are many urban myths about ageing and some of these apply to the brain the reviews included in this book are an attempt to flush out some of these myths and arm the clinician and general researcher with the empirical facts that can be mustered to substantiate claims about ageing there are many salient questions is cognitive change to be expected in an elderly individual is this change progressive relentless and unselective or is it focal and constrained would every person who lived long enough develop alzheimer s disease do our neurones die as we get old what happens to the size of the brain and its metabolic activity how do our hormones change with age can anti oxidants slow or even stop the

process of ageing are genes important in the ageing brain or is it all in the environment how much of what we are is due to what we eat the contributors to this book each an expert in their field have addressed some of these questions in a language simple enough for a general reader to understand the book also deals with some of the most prominent brain disorders of old age alzheimer s disease parkinson s disease vascular dementia and depression the focus is on the impact of ageing on these disorders the discussions lay out a broad map for the clinician dealing with neuropsychiatric disorders and the future researcher of brain ageing in a field in which the developments are too numerous for any one individual to keep pace with this book presents up to date summaries that can be a useful starting point the field of brain ageing abounds in tabloid science this book counters this by providing a strong empirical grounding and considered synthesis of the research

almost 25 years have passed since the demography of aging 1994 was published by the national research council future directions for the demography of aging is in many ways the successor to that original volume the division of behavioral and social research at the national institute on aging nia asked the national academies of sciences engineering and medicine to produce an authoritative guide to new directions in demography of aging the papers published in this report were originally presented and discussed at a public workshop held in washington d c august 17 18 2017 the workshop discussion made evident that major new advances had been made in the last two decades but also that new trends and research directions have emerged that call for innovative conceptual design and measurement approaches the report reviews these recent trends and also discusses future directions for research on a range of topics that are central to current research in the demography of aging looking back over the past two decades of demography of aging research shows remarkable advances in our understanding of the health and well being of the older population equally exciting is that this report sets the stage for the next two decades of innovative research□ a period of rapid growth in the older american population

this is the second edition of a well received book that reviews classical epidemiological and clinical research designs with a specific focus on aging chapters cover basic topics like the scientific method ethics and the consequences of certain

exclusion criteria the work also includes a look at clinical concepts like multimorbidity frailty and functionality new material includes chapters such as geroscience health systems research big data and data mining financing and future of aging research the authors reveal the issues and challenges for researchers of age and aging and also consider from basic to clinical and from clinical to public policies of social and health care the focus on aging is what gives this book its valuable perspective on research methodology all authors have considerable experience in aging geriatrics or gerontology and each chapter includes both a theoretical framework and practical examples of studies in aging readers will discover study designs that are reviewed for basic structure main flaws and advantages and are analyzed for specific conditions and variables regarding aging this text is suited to both health care professionals caring for older adults and researchers who are new to research in aging it is relevant across the disciplines including medicine psychology social sciences and dentistry and it supports learning with graphs and figures

the population of asia is growing both larger and older demographically the most important continent on the world asia s population currently estimated to be 4.2 billion is expected to increase to about 5.9 billion by 2050 rapid declines in fertility together with rising life expectancy are altering the age structure of the population so that in 2050 for the first time in history there will be roughly as many people in asia over the age of 65 as under the age of 15 it is against this backdrop that the division of behavioral and social research at the u s national institute on aging nia asked the national research council nrc through the committee on population to undertake a project on advancing behavioral and social research on aging in asia aging in asia findings from new and emerging data initiatives is a peer reviewed collection of papers from china india indonesia japan and thailand that were presented at two conferences organized in conjunction with the chinese academy of sciences indian national science academy indonesian academy of sciences and science council of japan the first conference was hosted by the chinese academy of social sciences in beijing and the second conference was hosted by the indian national science academy in new delhi the papers in the volume highlight the contributions from new and emerging

data initiatives in the region and cover subject areas such as economic growth labor markets and consumption family roles and responsibilities and labor markets and consumption

the growth of the over sixty five population and the recognition of the enormous implications of this growth for the well being of our society is the basis for this vital text in earlier days of gerontology research methods used were often simply those same methods used in researching younger age groups as one may clearly surmise the transferral of these traditional methods were apt to pose some special problems when imported for use with the aged traditional methods had to be adjusted to take account of age related differences special research methods for gerontology recognizes the need to study older people in their great variety as a broad class as opposed to the elderly the content of the volume deals with longitudinal studies cross sectional research theory based methodological work special methods and procedures that contribute to the soundness of the design and research method

erdman palmore has written a comprehensive systematic summary of all extant findings on social patterns in normal aging learned from the landmark duke longitudinal studies in aging palmore discusses the implications of these findings for major issues in gerontology and answers such questions as do elderly people reduce their social activity do they come to resemble one another or become more different as they age do major events in later life produce stress resulting in physical and or mental illnesses does sexual activity maintain or reduce life satisfaction and longevity palmore s conclusions challenge many current ideas and prejudices widely held about people over the age of 65
