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donald davidson has prepared a new edition of his classic 1980 collection of essays on actions and events including two additional essays in this seminal investigation of the nature of human action davidson argues for an ontology which includes events along with persons and other objects certain events are identified and explained as actions when they are viewed as caused and rationalized by reasons these same events when described in physical biological or physiological terms may be explained by appeal to natural laws the mental and the physical thus constitute irreducibly discrete ways of explaining and understanding events and their causal relations among the topics discussed are freedom to act weakness of the will the logical form of talk about actions intentions and causality the logic of practical reasoning hume's theory of the indirect passions and the nature and limits of decision theory the introduction cross references and appendices emphasize the relations between the essays and explain how davidson's views have developed

the guiding theme of these essays is the fate of the imagination and the condition of art in the modern world where both appear to be enfeebled by scientific hubris undermined by psychological self questioning and compromised by political disaster erich heller traces this predicament with subtlety and profundity from hegel's and nietzsche's diagnoses to the various truces and manoeuvres through which remarkable victories have nonetheless been achieved such as the comic triumphs of wilhelm busch as elsewhere in professor heller's work thomas mann's attempt to outwit and redeem his circumstances through art despite them as he said himself occupies a central place three of the present essays are devoted to him others consider kleist fontane hamsun karl kraus and the crucial figures of hölderlin who plays such a central

role in heidegger's later philosophical writings and Rilke written with feeling and the distinctive elegance and wit that have characterized all of Professor Heller's work the essays here reaffirm the vital interdependence of literature and human values

rescued in 1972 from a storeroom in which rats and seeping water had severely damaged the fifty-year-old manuscript this text is the earliest major work 1919-1921 of the great Russian philosopher M. M. george boole 1815 1864 is well known to mathematicians for his research and textbooks on the calculus but his name has spread world wide for his innovations in symbolic logic and the development and applications made since his day the utility of boolean algebra in computing has greatly increased curiosity in the nature and extent of his achievements his work is most accessible in his two books on logic a mathematical analysis of logic 1947 and an investigation of the laws of thought 1954 but at various times he wrote manuscript essays especially after the publication of the second book several were intended for a non technical work the philosophy of logic which he was not able to complete this volume contains an edited selection which not only relates them to boole's publications and the historical context of his time but also describes their strange history of family followers and scholars have tried to confection an edition the book will appeal to logicians mathematicians and philosophers and those interested in the histories of the corresponding subjects and also students of the early victorian britain in which they were written

contemporary analytic philosophy can generally be characterized by the following tendencies commitment to first order predicate logic as the only viable formal logic rejection of correspondence theories of truth a view of existence as something expressed by the existential quantifier a metaphysics that doesn't give the world as a whole its due this book seeks to offer an alternative analytic theory one that provides a unified account of what there is how we speak about it the underlying logic of our language how the truth of what we say is determined and the central role of the real world in all of this the result is a robust account of reality the inspiration for

many of the ideas that constitute this overall theory comes from such sources as aristotle leibniz ryle and sommers

these philosophical essays are related by a concern to develop and defend an aristotelian view that we are both essentially and entirely creatures of mortal flesh and blood and uniquely rational animals

the eminent philosopher and classical scholar alexander nehamas presents here a collection of his most important essays on plato and socrates the papers are unified in theme by the idea that plato's central philosophical concern in metaphysics ethics and aesthetics was to distinguish the authentic from the fake the original from its imitations in approach the collection displays nehamas's characteristic combination of analytical rigor and sensitivity to the literary form and dramatic effect of plato's work together the papers represent nehamas's distinct and original contributions to scholarship on plato and socrates and serve as a comprehensive introduction to the thought of these two philosophers in the book's opening section nehamas discusses plato's representation of socrates as a model of authentic human goodness showing that plato's socrates is a more skeptical troubling and individualistic thinker than is usually supposed the papers in the second section form a sustained defense of a new and important understanding of plato's theory of the forms and the evolution of that theory in plato's later writings the third section examines plato's contention that popular entertainment by which he meant greek epic and tragic poetry misleads its audience into a debased life an argument nehamas relates to modern anxieties about television and other forms of popular culture the collection also includes a discussion of plato's use of the dialogue form in his representation of socrates and carefully examines the combination of literary and philosophical elements in his work nehamas argues in the book that plato's specific judgments of what is authentic are often flawed but that his idea of authenticity as the mark of truth beauty and goodness is stronger than many modern scholars have assumed in drawing together nehamas's many influential ideas about plato and socrates virtues of authenticity is a major contribution to the study of ancient greek philosophy

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
