first published in 1987 this is a book about the music of the caribbean from calypso and ska through to reggae and caribbean club culture

this book provides a multidisciplinary overview of cultural models of emotions with particular focus on how cultural parameters of societies affect the emotional life of people in different cultural contexts going beyond traditional dichotomy of west east comparison and related parameters of culture such as individualism collectivism and power distance it also examines many other cultural dimensions that have received less attention in mainstream research among the topics covered basic emotional processes in cultural contexts cultural complexity of emotions survival and self expression cultural values facial expressiveness of emotion across cultures cultural models of emotion is a comprehensive review of international perspectives on cross cultural exploration of emotions and will be a useful resource for researchers in anthropology sociology psychology and communication studies

over the last five centuries the story of the americas has been a story of the mixing of races and cultures not surprisingly the issue of miscegenation with its attendant fears and hopes has been a pervasive theme in new world literature as writers from canada to argentina confront the legacy of cultural hybridization and fusion this book takes up the challenge of transforming american literary and cultural studies into a comparative discipline by examining the dynamics of racial and cultural mixture and its opposite tendency racial and cultural disjunction in the literatures of the

americas editors kaup and rosenthal have brought together a distinguished set of scholars who compare the treatment of racial and cultural mixtures in literature from north america the caribbean and latin america from various angles they remap the americas as a multicultural and multiracial hemisphere with a common history of colonialism slavery racism and racial and cultural hybridity

this fascinating book explores the interface between global processes identity formation and the production of culture examining ideas ranging from world systems theory to postmodernism jonathan friedman investigates the relations between the global and the local to show how cultural fragmentation and modernist homogenization are equally constitutive trends of global reality with examples taken from a rich variety of theoretical sources ethnographic accounts of historical eras the analysis ranges across the cultural formations of ancient greece contemporary processes of hawaiian cultural identification and congolese beauty cults throughout the author examines the interdependency of world market and local cultural

by examining black mixed race identities in the city through a series of historical vantage points making mixed race provides in depth insights into the geographical and historical contexts that shape the possibilities and constraints for identifications whilst popular representations of mixed race often conceptualise it as a contemporary phenomenon and are couched in discourses of futurity this book dislodges it from the current moment to explore its emergence as a racialised category and personal identity over time in addition to tracing the temporality of mixed race the contributions show the utility of place as an analytical tool for mixed race studies the conceptual framework for the book place time and personal identity offers a timely intervention to the scholarship that encourages us to look outside of individual subjectivities and critically examine the structural contexts that shape black mixed race lives the book centres around

the life histories of 37 people of mixed white and black caribbean heritage born between 1959 and 1994 in britain s second largest city birmingham the intimate life portraits of mixed identity reveal how colourism family school gender whiteness racism and resistance have been experienced against the backdrop of post war immigration thatcherism the ascendancy of black diasporic youth cultures and contemporary post race discourses it will be of interest to researchers postgraduate and undergraduate students who work on mixed race and ethnicity studies in academic areas including geographies of race youth identities cultures gender colonial legacies intersectionality racism and colourism

this volume considers the relationship between architectural form and different layers of identity assertion in roman egypt it stresses the sophistication of the concept of identity and the complex yet close association between architecture and identity

as hip hop artists constantly struggle to keep it real this fascinating study examines the debates over the core codes of hip hop authenticity as it reflects and reacts to problematic black images in popular culture placing hip hop in its proper cultural political and social contexts

despite the passage of time our vision of native americans remains locked up within powerful stereotypes that s why some images of indians can be so unexpected and disorienting what is geronimo doing sitting in a cadillac why is an indian woman in beaded buckskin sitting under a salon hairdryer such images startle and challenge our outdated visions even as the latter continue to dominate relations between native and non native americans philip deloria explores this cultural discordance to show how stereotypes and indian experiences have competed for ascendancy in the wake of the military conquest of native america and the nation s subsequent embrace of native authenticity rewriting the story of the national encounter with modernity deloria provides revealing accounts of indians doing unexpected things singing

opera driving cars acting in hollywood in ways that suggest new directions for american indian history focusing on the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries a time when according to most standard american narratives indian people almost dropped out of history itself deloria argues that a great many indians engaged the very same forces of modernization that were leading non indians to reevaluate their own understandings of themselves and their society he examines longstanding stereotypes of indians as invariably violent suggesting that even as such views continued in american popular culture they were also transformed by the violence at wounded knee he tells how indians came to represent themselves in wild west shows and hollywood films and also examines sports music and even indian people s use of the automobile an ironic counterpoint to today s highways teeming with dakota pick ups and cherokee sport utility vehicles throughout deloria shows us anomalies that resist pigeonholing and force us to rethink familiar expectations whether considering the hollywood films of james young deer or the hall of fame baseball career of pitcher charles albert bender he persuasively demonstrates that a significant number of indian people engaged in modernity and helped shape its anxieties and its textures at the very moment they were being defined as primitive these secret histories deloria suggests compel us to reconsider our own current expectations about what indian people should be how they should act and even what they should look like more important he shows how such seemingly harmless even if unconscious expectations contribute to the racism and injustice that still haunt the experience of many native american people today

reassesses the short life and career of american essayist critic and founder of cultural radicalism bourne 1886 1918 known today mostly for his opposition to us military involvement in europe and warnings about the military industrial complex vaughan political science u of minnesota duluth argues that his stance from outside establishment perspectives was not a retreat from politics as many have claimed but a form of political engagement free from the suppositions that impede

within their approach to trace the routes of music and music's impact on identity formation the editors take the popularity of american music more or less for granted most genres addressed in this study have emerged within the multiethnic us or the americas on a larger scale most have traversed through the americas and in different adaptations through different parts of the world tracing the migration of sounds the editors see american music at home and abroad as an intricate part of a historical process of globalization and as embedded in complex and multidirectional processes of exchange and transformation they understand the migration of american forms of music not as a one dimensional homogenizing process of americanization but rather as a multidirectional journey with diverse and multi layered forms of music emerging in different and shifting locales the contributors cover a broad range of musical genres ranging from sacred music and avant garde music to jazz reggae and rock moreover crossovers between film theater video art and music are explored in its interdisciplinary and international orientation this book will contribute to the new direction american studies has taken recently and expand a cultural studies approach to the field of music at the same time

this volume contains both reprints of articles and new essays about specific aspects of the social history of canadian music designed for courses in canadian music history it brings together a body of interdisciplinary research that students often overlook within their specific foci of the individual areas studies of euro canadian classical music and jazz are integrated with studies of traditional and popular music thereby acknowledging that these domains while tenaciously separated in university curricula are interconnected many of the articles focus on the experiential rather than on

objectified works of art the processes of creating and using music are emphasized

in the land of samba there is another vibrant culture capturing the attention of urban youth this compelling account argues that hip hop while certainly a product of globalized flows of information and technology is by no means homogenous using more than five years of anthropological fieldwork in são paulo brazil s largest city pardue represents culture as generative and thus meaningful as a set of practices when interpreted in this manner local hip hoppers become closer to what they claim to be subjects rather than objects of history and everyday life in his ethnography the first in english to look at brazilian hip hop pardue highlights the analytical categories of race class gender and territory

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
