discusses the characters plot and writing of night by elie wiesel includes critical essays on the novel and a brief biography of the author

i died at auschwitz french writer charlotte delbo asserts and nobody knows it möbian nights reading literature and darkness develops a new understanding of literary reading that in the wake of disasters like the holocaust death remains a premise of our experience rather than a future challenging customary aesthetic assumptions that we write in order not to die sandor goodhart suggests with kafka we write to die drawing upon analyses developed by girard foucault blanchot and levinas along with examples from homer to beckett möbian nights proposes that all literature works autobiographically which is to say in the wake of disaster with the credo i died therefore i am and for which the language of topology for example the möbius strip offers a vocabulary for naming the deep structure of such literary critical and scriptural sacrificial and anti sacrificial dynamics

elie wiesel is an internationally known author human rights advocate and lecturer night his first book 1956 in yiddish 1958 in french 1960 in english a new english translation appeared in 2006 has become a classic memoir of a jewish survivor of the holocaust the seventeen essays of this volume in the mla series approaches to teaching world literature examine the historical cultural and literary contexts of wiesel s book as well as strategies for teaching it in the classroom part 1 materials provides resources on the jewish ghettos and concentration camps of world war ii on the jewish faith and religious practices on the genre of victims diaries on the critical reception of night on wiesel s other work and on available audiovisual materials part 2 approaches addresses many subjects among them wiesel s narrative techniques the representation of auschwitz the use of different languages the comparison of wiesel with primo levi the problems of memory and bearing witness the christian response to the holocaust and the challenge of teaching a grim and painful text to students

how are holocaust events remembered and narrated and why what knowledge can holocaust testimony convey christine june

wunderli explores these questions as she examines four works by holocaust survivor elie wiesel guided by bourdieu's theory of literary field as well as young's theory of literary representation she traces hasidic influences in wiesel's writing her conclusions are telling wiesel's narratives are born as memory is pulled towards both auschwitz and the shtetl caught up in the tension between the two still the emerging trajectory is one of hope led by a new categorical imperative

fantasies of witnessing explores how and why those deeply interested in the holocaust yet with no direct familial connection to it endeavor to experience it vicariously through sites or texts designed to make it real for nonwitnesses gary weissman argues that far from overwhelming nonwitnesses with its magnitude of horror the holocaust threatens to feel distant and unreal a prevailing rhetoric of secondary memory and trauma he contends and efforts to portray the holocaust as an immediate and personal experience are responses to an encroaching sense of unreality in america we are haunted not by the traumatic impact of the holocaust but by its absence when we take an interest in the holocaust we are not overcoming a fearful aversion to its horror but endeavoring to actually feel the horror of what otherwise eludes us weissman focuses on specific attempts to locate the holocaust in the person of elie wiesel the most renowned survivor and his classic memoir night in videotaped survivor stories and lawrence l langer's celebrated book holocaust testimonies and in the films shoah and schindler's list these representations he explains constitute a movement away from the view popularized by wiesel that those who did not live through the holocaust will never be able to grasp its horror and toward re-creating the holocaust as an experience nonwitnesses may put themselves through it is only by acknowledging the desire that gives shape to such representations and by exploring their place in the ongoing contest over who really knows the holocaust and feels its horror that we can arrive at a more candid assessment of our current and future relationships to the holocaust he says

elie wiesel is a master storyteller with the ability to use storytelling as a form of activism from his landmark memoir night to his novels and numerous retellings of hasidic legends wiesel's literature emphasizes storytelling and he frequently refers to

himself as a storyteller rather than an author or historian in this work essays examine wiesel s roots in jewish storytelling traditions influences from religious folk and secular sources education yiddish background holocaust experience and writing style emphasized throughout is wiesel s use of multiple sources in an effort to reach diverse audiences

presents an encyclopedia of religion and politics in america including short biographies of important political and religious figures like ralph abernathy civil rights leader and ralph waldo emerson writer and synopses of religious entities like the branch davidians and the episcopal church as well as important court cases of relevancy like epperson et al v arkansas having to do with evolution

wiesel s account of his survival as a teenager in the nazi death camps including a new preface in which he reflects on the enduring importance of night and his lifelong passionate dedication to ensuring that the world never forgets man s capacity for inhumanity to man

discusses post holocaust theology in the light of elie wiesel s thought particularly as expressed in three of his works night the oath and the fifth son analyzes the philosophies of emil fackenheim richard rubenstein jürgen moltmann and paul van buren in relation to the question how could god permit the holocaust expands on the image of the wandering jew in wiesel s works the holocaust survivor is identified with the wanderer caught between the memory of the victims and a transcendent hope for the future contends that the holocaust ushered in a twilight period in human history in which world identity is transitional and that wiesel presents the possibility for new qualities of life to emerge

a digest of plots and critiques of 318 twentieth century nonfiction works in the areas of autobiography memoirs philosophy anthropology psychology and other subjects for the non specialist reader publisher s catalog
