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institutional ethnography ie originated as a feminist alternative to sociologies defining people as the objects of study instead ie explores the social relations that dominate the life of the particular subject in focus simply institutional ethnography is written by two pioneers in the field and grounded in decades of ground breaking work dorothy smith and alison griffith lay out the basics of how institutional ethnography proceeds as a sociology the book introduces the concepts discourse work text that institutional ethnographers have found to be key ideas used to organize what they learn from the study of people s experience simply institutional

ethnography builds an ethnography that makes this material visible as coordinated sequences of social relations that reach beyond the particularities of local experience in explicating the foundations of ie and its principal concepts simply institutional ethnography reflects on the ways in which the field may move forward

a comprehensive guide to the alternative sociology originating in the work of dorothy e smith this handbook not only explores the basic founding principles of institutional ethnography ie but also captures current developments approaches and debates now widely known as a sociology for people ie offers the tools to uncover the social relations shaping the everyday world in which we live and is utilized by scholars and social activists in sociology and beyond including such fields as education nursing social work linguistics health and medical care environmental studies and other social service related fields covering the theoretical and methodological underpinnings of ie recent developments and current areas of research and application that have yet to appear in the literature the palgrave handbook of institutional ethnography is suitable for both experienced practitioners of institutional ethnography and those who are exploring this approach for the first time

for years hiv activists and researchers have expressed deep concerns about the stigmatizing and sensational tone of news stories about hiv criminalization digital news and hiv criminalization investigates the everyday work of journalists and uncovers how newswork routines are hooked into other institutions including the criminal legal system police and public health that regulate the daily lives of people living with hiv this lively institutional ethnography offers key insights into how the digital news media ecosystem is socially organized it reveals that the fast paced conditions of digital news media in the age of convergence journalism require the constant rapid production of sensational news stories that will be consumed widely by online audiences often resulting in news writing that perpetuates social harms connected to stigmatizing racist and anti immigrant views the book illustrates how biased reporting on hiv criminalization reflects broader trends in online news and presents opportunities for hiv activists to form coalitions with other groups negatively affected by the current landscape of convergence journalism tracing how work that produces and circulates a standard genre of news story about hiv criminalization is coordinated across time and space digital news and hiv criminalization offers a groundwork for political action aimed at disrupting the production of stigmatizing news stories

museums of the commons examines l internationale an ongoing confederation between six museums and contemporary art institutions in europe drawing on extensive interviews with the directors curators public programs officers in all the museums as well as artists critics and members associated with them the book provides a transversal account that connects the ideas across the various institutions and situates this in the wider visual and social context chronicling the challenges faced by the museums papastergiadis goes on to situate their responses within the wider political and cultural context that is shaping the future of all contemporary art museums five key domains of research are explored within

the book the genealogy of the museum the need for alternative models of trans institutional governance examples of innovation in the spaces of aesthetic production experimentation in the forms of partnership and engagement with constituents and finally examination of the impact of a collaborative and collective regime of artistic practices museums of the commons provides a multi perspectival account of a trans institutional and transnational collaboration which will be of great interest to academics researchers and postgraduate students working in the fields of museum studies cultural studies art history media and communication

published under the garamond imprint available in the us through altamira press this is a book about a distinctive methodological approach inspired by one of canada s most respected scholars dorothy smith institutional ethnography aims to answer questions about how everyday life is organized what is conventionally understood as the relationship of micro to macro processes is in institutional ethnography conceptualized and explored in terms of ruling relations the authors suggest that institutional ethnographers must adopt a particular research stance one that recognizes that people s own knowledge and ways of knowing are crucial elements of social action and thus of social analysis specific attention to text analysis is integral to the approach institutional ethnography is remarkably well suited to the human service curriculum and the training of professionals and activists its strategy for learning how to understand problems existing in everyday life appeals to many researchers who are looking for guidance on how to take practical action at the same time the highly elaborated theoretical foundation of institutional ethnography is difficult to deal with in the brief time most students are in the classroom the authors successfully tackle the issue of teaching and applying institutional ethnography campbell and gregor have been testing out instructional methods and materials for many years mapping social relations is the product of that effort

now in its fourth edition this leading introduction to ethnography has been thoroughly updated and substantially rewritten the volume offers a systematic introduction to ethnographic principles and practice and includes a new chapter on ethnography in the digital world the authors argue that ethnography is best understood as a reflexive process this requires recognition that social research is part of the world that it studies and demands that researchers reflect on how they shape both data and analysis starting in chapter 1 with an outline of the principle of reflexivity against the background of competing research philosophies the authors go on to discuss the main features of ethnographic work including the selection and sampling of cases the problem of access field relations and observation interviewing the use of documents recording and organizing data the process of data analysis and writing research reports there is also consideration of the ethical issues involved in ethnographic research throughout the discussion draws on a wide range of illustrative material from classic and more recent studies within a global context the new edition of this popular textbook will be an indispensable resource for undergraduate and postgraduate students and for all researchers using ethnographic methods in the social sciences and the humanities

this edited volume gathers top scholars from across disciplines generations and countries to provide constructive commentary on the theory methods and practices of institutional ethnography these contributions explore themes of relevance to institutional ethnographers that are both enduring and newly emerging how institutional ethnographers can take an expanded view of social institutions how they might explore the dynamics of ruling relations over time

what results from understanding experience as dialogue including internal or in skull dialogue the significance of standpoint and the opportunities for institutional ethnographers to move beyond texts as they discover and describe social relations a key aspect of critical commentary on institutional ethnography and one that distinguishes it from others is the forward looking orientation of the authors this perspective allows them to establish bridges between the institutional ethnography that has been developed heretofore and the potential that is looming for such a mode of inquiry into the social as such the book is both informative and inspirational

this entry discusses the conceptualization of institutional ethnography ie as well as the parameters of employing this methodology it reviews several previous ie projects in sexuality health care education welfare and work policy development home and organizational life because an understanding of dorothy smith s ontology of the social which organizes her feminist epistemology a sociology for people is important in employing ie this entry summarizes her ontological and epistemological arguments in addition this entry offers potential new directions for ie including a look at social relations in cyberspace and the potential connection with queer and postcolonial theories

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
