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this book analyzes the work of iconic chilean author alberto blest gana 1830 1920 through the lens of machiavelli and cervantes transatlantic in scope it uses literary studies and cultural history to delve into chile s emergence as a nation and to illustrate a set of conflicts among the political parties and social classes in the early days of independence the 1830s and 1850s with a focus on martín rivas novela de costumbres politico sociales martin rivas a novel of socio political manners 1862 el ideal de un calavera the ideal of a rogue libertine 1863 and durante la reconquista during the re conquest 1897 this study examines the political and social exchanges and the place of social order in a critical period in chile s national development blest gana s three novels vividly depict the whys and hows of chile s early political struggles dramatically underscoring the painfully real and very deep disagreements about the nation s early direction and sense of identity and showing how political and cultural antagonisms resulted from social hierarchies for some patria was synonymous with order itself order needed to be established and maintained no matter how severe the measures the book is informed by a desire to use early narrative expressions of chile s national identity to illuminate the

political and cultural heritage of the twentieth century especially the disruptions that occurred during the government and ultimate ousting of salvador allende gossens 1908 1973 president of chile from 1970 to 1973 in *blest gana* s three texts the enmities among chileans reveal a fundamental and ongoing social political and cultural disunity this crack in the national foundation accounts in part for what erupted during the government of allende an idealist and a quixotic individual who believed in socialism via democracy and fought for equality in society betrayed from all sides allende was violently removed from power by a military junta led by augusto pinochet ugarte 1915 2006 who ruled from 1973 to 1990 under pinochet s dictatorship books and print materials were scrutinized and censored in a way that was not unlike the period when cervantes published the first and second parts of *don quijote* martín rivas however continued to be read in schools but mostly as a love story with its political commentary effectively concealed

with the prince machiavelli made his name synonymous with intrigue and cunning for all time his instructions to the prince on achieving and maintaining power by any and all means available became the archetypical philosophy of the ends justify the means machiavelli advocated that political expediency supersedes morality and that success by any means is its own justification his cold calculating logic sweeps aside and dismisses all arguments against the use of every manner of deceit and dishonesty for a ruler to achieve his ends on the basis that those ends once achieved are in themselves sufficient justification not only does machiavelli make philosophical arguments for his viewpoint he gives numerous practical examples of behavior which are generally considered to be both ruthless and invariably successful for nearly 500 years politicians of all stripes have found that in ignoring machiavelli's views they become easy prey to those who are willing to employ machiavellian

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niccolò di bernardo dei machiavelli 3 may 1469 21 june 1527 was an italian renaissance diplomat philosopher and writer best known for the prince il principe written in 1513 he has often been called the father of modern political philosophy or political science for many years he served as a senior official in the florentine republic with responsibilities in diplomatic and military affairs he wrote comedies carnival songs and poetry his personal correspondence is of high importance to historians and scholars he worked as secretary to the second chancery of the republic of florence from 1498 to 1512 when the medici were out of power machiavelli's name came to evoke unscrupulous politicians of the sort machiavelli advised most famously in the prince machiavelli considered political battles not through a lens of morality but as though they are a board game with established rules his experience showed him that politics have always been played with deception treachery and crime he also notably said that a ruler who is establishing a kingdom or a republic and is criticized for his deeds including violence should be excused when the intention and the result is beneficial machiavelli's prince was much read as a manuscript long before it was published in 1532 and the reaction was mixed some considered it a straightforward description of the evil means used by bad rulers others read in it evil recommendations to tyrants to help them maintain their power

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nicolo machiavelli was born at florence on 3rd may 1469 he was the second son of bernardo di nicolo machiavelli a lawyer of some repute and of bartolommea di stefano nelli his wife both parents were members of the old florentine nobility his life falls naturally into three periods each of which singularly enough constitutes a distinct and important era in the history of florence his youth was concurrent with the greatness of florence as an italian power under the guidance of lorenzo de medici il magnifico the downfall of the medici in florence occurred in 1494 in which year machiavelli entered the public service during his official career florence was free under the government of a republic which lasted until 1512 when the medici returned to power and machiavelli lost his office the medici again ruled florence from 1512 until 1527 when they were once more driven out this was the period of machiavelli's literary activity and increasing influence but he died within a few weeks of the expulsion of the medici on 22nd june 1527 in his fifty eighth year without having regained office

florentine statesman writer and political theorist niccolò machiavelli 1469 1527 considered the art of war his most important work five centuries later after serving as a guide to frederick the great napoleon and countless other military leaders it remains an authoritative treatise on the fundamentals of warfare best known as the political theorist who wrote the prince machiavelli used this book to advocate strategies for italy's increased military prowess and political strength machiavelli was the first to propose a global context for the functional unity of war and politics with the former serving as an instrument of the latter written in the form of dialogues this 1520 work represents a humanistic treatment rather than a textbook approach it clearly states and discusses the fundamentals of military organization and strategy handling recruitment and weapons motivating troops demoralizing enemies and achieving tactical and strategic advantages essential to the education of students of military history strategy and theory the art of war continues to inspire readers

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
