chinese art has experienced its most profound metamorphosis since the early 1950s transforming from humble realism to socialist realism from revolutionary art to critical realism then avant garde movement and globalized chinese art with a hybrid mix of chinese philosophy imported but revised marxist ideology and western humanities chinese artists have created an alternative approach after a great ideological and aesthetic transition in the 1980s toward its own contemporaneity though interacting and intertwining with the art of rest of the world this book will investigate from the perspective of an activist critic and historian who grew up prior to and participated in the great transition and then researched and taught the subject the evolution of chinese art in modern and contemporary times the volume will be a comprehensive and insightful history of the one of the most sophisticated and unparalleled artistic and cultural phenomena in the modern world

choice outstanding academic title 2023 a critical analysis of contemporary art collections and the value form this book shows why the nonprofit system is unfit to administer our common collections and offers solutions for diversity reform and redistributive restructuring in the united states institutions administered by the nonprofit system have an ambiguous status as they are neither entirely private nor fully public among nonprofits the museum is unique as it is the only institution where trustees tend to collect the same objects they hold in public trust on behalf of the nation if not humanity the public serves as alibi for establishing the symbolic value of art which sustains its monetary value and its markets this structure allows for wealthy individuals at the helm to gain financial benefits from and ideological control over what is at its core purpose a public system the dramatic growth of the art market and the development of financial tools based on art collateral loans exacerbate the contradiction between the needs of museum leadership versus that of the public indeed a history of

private support in the us is a history of racist discrimination and the common collections reflect this fact a history of how private collections were turned public gives context since the late renaissance private collections legitimized the prince s right to rule and later with the great revolutions display consolidated national identity but the rise of the american museum reversed this and re privatized the public collection a materialist description of the museum as a model institution of the liberal nation state reveals constellations of imperialist social relations

the historical dictionary of contemporary art illuminates important artists styles and movements of the past 70 years beginning with the immediate post world war ii period it encompasses earlier 20th century masters including pablo picasso henri matisse henry moore alberto giacometti joan miró jean dubuffet stuart davis georgia o keeffe and other well known figures who remained creatively productive while also inspiring younger generations the book covers subsequent developments including abstract expressionism happenings pop art minimalism conceptual art arte povera feminist art photorealism neo expressionism and postmodernism as well as the contributions of such artists as jackson pollock willem de kooning mark rothko helen frankenthaler joan mitchell robert rauschenberg david hockney ellsworth kelly francis bacon louise bourgeois lucio fontana andy warhol richard serra donald judd joseph beuys christo anselm kiefer judy chicago ai weiwei and jeff koons historical dictionary of contemporary art contains a chronology an introduction and an extensive bibliography including more than 900 cross referenced entries on important artists styles terms and movements this book is an excellent resource for students researchers and anyone wanting to know more about contemporary art

chapter 1 presents a broad introduction to important developments in art and to ideas and events that influenced art in the period from 1980 through 2011 it introduces ideas that apply to all the themes discussed in subsequent chapters chapters 2 through 9 delve into the themes themselves one theme to each chapter in the following order identity the body time memory place language science and spirituality chapters 2 through 9 follow a similar format an introduction situates the theme within a broad social and cultural matrix a brief historical overview discusses artistic approaches to the theme and related concepts in earlier eras recent artists treatments of the theme are evaluated in terms of key theories and strategies of art production and the theme is examined in terms of subcategories that have received critical attention in contemporary exhibitions and publications following an in depth discussion of the theme each chapter provides two profiles of individual artists each profile presents a concise examination of the ideas and approaches of an artist who has devoted a substantial portion of his or her creative energies to exploring aspects of the theme under discussion
